A SCOTTISH MALAYAN.

Keeping Tropical Memories Green.

July 30 (by Air Mail).

There is a Malayan in Kirkcaldy, Fife, Scotland, who believes in keeping green his memories of Malaya in a practical manner. Mr. John Galloway, who was an official in Kuala Lumpur for some twenty years, has presented to the local Museum a collection of curios from the F.M.S. in memory of his brother, the late Mr. Patrick James Galloway, and has also presented some fifty volumes of Malayan and Far Eastern interest to the Kirkcaldy Library. Every year, too, he presents bound volumes of magazines devoted to Malayan matters to the Library.

The Museum Collection contains a piece of Chinese needlework which was part of the police court exhibits in a Secret Society Case at Kuala Lumpur. It was given to Mr. Galloway by the Superintendent of Prisons, through the courtesy of the British Resident.

When Mr. Galloway was in Malaya, he took a great interest in the Kuala Lumpur Museum, and presented to it seven birds, rare to Malaya, which he shot himself. One of these is an English snipe.

He is living at 217, Gloucester Road, Cheltenham, Gloucester, but spends a long annual holiday in his native town of Kirkcaldy.
