The death has taken place, at 21, Onslow-square, S.W., at the age of 72, of Admiral Lionel Tufnell. Entering the Navy at the age of 13, he saw no active service during his early career, although the greater part of his time was spent on foreign service, notably on the China Station. He was promoted to Captain in 1901 and, when commanding H.M.S. Astrea in China, he landed a force to quell riots at Shanghai, thus saving a difficult situation. For this action he was awarded the C.M.G., and also the Order of the Rising Sun. On attaining flag rank he retired and was appointed Naval Adviser to the Greek Government. Admiral Tufnell married, in 1887, Clara Evelyn, daughter of Thomas Cadell, of Wotonga, Sydney, New South Wales.
