THE RAILWAY.

THE line is now clear to Serendab, and the first train will run at 1.55 this afternoon. The department have engaged the services of Mr. N. O. Maynard to clear the big slip at the far end, and, thanks to fair weather, high wages, and departmental energy, the work proceeds briskly all along the line.

Yong Wan, cashier of the Goods Department of Kuala Lumpur, has been arrested on a charge of embezzlement. The case, which has been three times postponed, is before the Assistant Magistrate's court.

THE NEW GAOL.

It appears that several hundred prisoners are still quartered at the Pudoah gaol, and that the beri-beri is by no means stamped out. The cholera epidemic was clearly due to the water supply, for only one case occurred after the gaol was connected with the Ampang Waterworks, but the beri-beri cannot be disposed of so easily. The gaol is damp, it is built in a graveyard, and the weather has been admirably suited to the requirements of the germ. During 1894, only 16 deaths occurred, while in the third quarter of this year, that is to say, from the 1st of July to September 30th, death has released no less than 105—chiefly short sentence prisoners. The fact of the short sentence man suffering more severely, has given rise to the idea that it may be necessary (in order to "make the punishment fit the crime") to punish gang robbers, etc. with trifling sentences and to reserve the heaviest penalties for petty larcenies and drunks. There is one consolation over this unfortunate choice of a site, and that is, that the old Kuala Lumpur Gaol was also built

on a graveyard, and, although for two or three years the mortality was heavy, the spot is now as healthy as can be desired.

THE POLICE OFFICES.

The Police Department have gone into the commodious premises built for them in High Street, opposite the High Street Police Station. The building, which cost about \$7,000, is a credit to the P.W.D. and will probably suit all the future requirements of the Department. On the upper storey the Captain Superintendent has his office. There is a large room for the native clerks and another for the chief clerk. On the ground floor are the License Offices, and separate apartments for the Assistant Superintendent and the Chief Inspector. The Police, like the Railway staff, will continue to occupy their own premises when the rest of the Service enter into occupation of the "largest Public Offices in the Straits Settlements."

POST CARDS.

Owing to the action of some extraordinary regulation, which ought at once to be repealed, it is impossible to obtain local post cards at the Post Office of this State. Unlike self-willed Perak, Selangor has no post cards of her own, and if the Government desire to sell post cards to the public they must buy them from the Straits. The Post Office officials state that they don't intend to order any more post cards this year for the all-sufficient reason that, at the stock taking festival at the end of the year, the State Treasurer will not recognise Straits Settlements post cards, and the officials themselves will have to make up the value of their unsold stock out of their own pockets.

SPORT.

The Acting-Resident with Captain Syers has gone to Kapar (a settlement between Klang and Kuala Selangor) for snipe shooting. An Association Football match, between "Officials," and "Non officials" on Wednesday last, resulted in a win for the latter by three goals to nil. On Saturday afternoon, a cricket match was played between a combination of the Railway and Public Works Departments and a team of Mr. Dougal's. Rain fell nearly all the afternoon, but only once stopped play for a few minutes. The game was drawn in favour of Mr. Dougal's team. The following are the scores:
