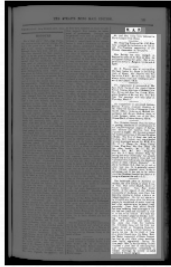

The Christian General Feng Yu-hsiang is getting abundance of advertisement in the English-language papers of Peking. His sermons and speeches have been reported at length. He has now arranged for weekly gatherings of Chinese Christian officials. The first of these was held on Sunday, 14th instant, and was attended by such prominent men as Dr. W.W. Yen, Dr. C. T. Wang, Dr. Wang Chung-Chang Ying-feng, Mr. Hsu Chien and his elder brother, Mr. Li Ho, Dr. David Yui, Mr. Nui Yung-chien and Mr. F. T. Sung. General Feng Yu-hsiang said that Christianity had greatly helped him in his military work and had "prevented him falling into the disastrous errors of other Chinese Generals." In short, he thanks God that he is not as other men are. It is generally agreed that China's greatest curse to day is militarism and it has yet to be shown what the Christian General has done or is doing to diminish the evil.—J. C.

The death took place at Jenderam on Sunday, the 11th instant, at about 5 a.m. of Tuan Haji Abdul Hamid, Kathi of Kuala Lumpur. Tuan Haji Abdul Hamid, at the request of the Malayan community of Jenderam, went there last Saturday evening to deliver a lecture on Islamic teachings. He did not appear to be ill until 5 a.m. when, after his morning prayer, he complained of severe coughing and a few minutes later he passed away peacefully. Tuan Haji Abdul Hamid had been suffering from consumption for the last two years and his death is said to be due to his ailment. His body was taken to Kuala Lumpur on Sunday morning. The funeral, which was attended by about 400 persons, took place on the same day from his residence No. 3 Gombak Lane, and his body was finally buried at Gonggang Cemetery. He leaves a widow and two brothers to mourn his loss. By the death of Tuan Haji Abdul Hamid, says the Malay Mail, the Malay community of Kuala Lumpur has lost an able Guru whose teachings were highly appreciated. During his five years' office in the Kathiship he had removed a great deal of misconceptions and misrepresentations interpolated as Islamic teachings by several so-called teachers of Islamic religion.
