K.L. BARRISTER'S DEATH.

Court Tributes To The Late Mr. S. N. Dutt.

(From Our Own Correspondent).

Kuala Lumpur, Apr. 5.

As already briefly telegraphed, the death occurred early this morning of Mr. S. N. Dutt, a local Indian barrister. His health has been poor for some time.

He was sitting in a chair, and his wife thought he was asleep, but when she endeavoured to waken him she found that he was dead.

Edinburgh Graduate.

A native of Bengal, Mr. Dutt was educated in Great Britain and graduated at Edinburgh University. After practising in Calcutta he came to Malaya in 1926, being first in Singapore with the firm of S. C. Goho and Co. and later opening his own practice in Kuala Lumpur.

He was a well-known personality in this town, and was well liked and respected. The sentiments of his colleagues in the legal profession were expressed in the Supreme Court this morning when Mr. Justice Burton took his seat on the bench.

The Hon. Mr. E. D. Shearn, speaking on behalf of the bar, said:

Before the business of the court commences I mention to your lordship the sad news of the death of Mr. Dutt, a member of this bar. Mr. Dutt died this morning after a short illness, and we of this bar wish to express our

esteem and regret, and our condolences with his wife.

Mr. Dutt was a member of Gray's Inn and was called to the bar in 1915. He practised in Calcutta for some time and then came to the Straits Settlements in the year 1926 and was admitted to the bar of the F.M.S. in the year 1931.

We who knew Mr. Dutt feel that his loss is a loss of a man whom we all knew and respected and we would like you to mark a token of our deep regret and sympathy with his relatives.

Police Court Reference.

References to the death of Mr. Dutt were also made before Mr. Justice Cussen by Mr. Jeff.
